DARG Data Session – 26.2.2025

Session Details: Exploring Openings in Bahá'í Consultation

Participants with experience in the principles of Bahá'í consultation apply them in various settings

Bahá'í consultation is a form of collective decision-making that emphasizes unity, detachment from personal opinions, and the shared search for truth. It involves open and respectful dialogue, where individuals contribute their perspectives without insisting on their own views, and the group strives to reach consensus through mutual understanding. A distinctive feature of many Bahá'í consultations is that they begin with a period of prayer, aiming to create a reflective and unified atmosphere before deliberation begins.

In this session, we will examine an opening of a Bahá'í consultation to explore how it is framed by the interactants.

The data is drawn from a collection of recorded Bahá'í consultations, part of the PhD research of Jean-Marie Nau (Educational Sciences, Faculty of Humanities, Education and Social Sciences, University of Luxembourg), supervised by Assoc. Prof. Patrick Sunnen. This research investigates the question:

"How are principles of unity & collective inquiry interactionally accomplished in Bahá'í consultations, and what do these reveal about the wider applicability of this consultation model in diverse settings?"

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The extract is taken from a collection of 11 recorded Bahá'í consultations.

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Transcript Annotations

Line 4: *Alláh-u-Abhá* is an Arabic phrase meaning "God the All-Glorious" and is commonly used as a greeting among some Bahá'ís. While it holds devotional significance in Bahá'í practice, its use as a greeting is not universal among Bahá'ís. Guidance from Bahá'í institutions encourages mindfulness of cultural and social contexts when using it in diverse settings. In this interaction, its usage may serve as a marker of affiliation, solidarity, or a routine greeting, depending on how participants orient to it in the sequential environment.

Lines 11-14: Mik is saying a short and well-known Bahá'í prayer for children.

Line 16: Lia calls Mik often 'dada'
